Introduction

This year's Festival is indeed a celebration of choral music in all its forms, from composition to performance, from Renaissance to contemporary, from small ensembles to large performing groups. The creation of new work is not just musical, as we maintain our visual arts initiative with commissions from Liam Lavery and Eithne Ring (Fleischmann International Trophy), and Don Cronin (Series of bronze awards for the National Competitions). We will feature the major contribution made by Cork City Music Library in both creating an archive, and digitising the large corpus of works commissioned by the Seminar on Contemporary Choral Music since its inception in 1962. We are particularly honoured this year that the members of the Choral Festival Network, of which CICF is an active member, have agreed to hold its General Assembly in Cork during the Festival. CFN is an international working network of qualified and like-minded International festivals and competitions, which ensures fair and transparent participants' conditions to choirs and individuals on the part of its associate members.

I take this opportunity to thank the Arts Council, Fáilte Ireland, Cork City Council, Cork County Council, for their continued financial grant aid, and to Heineken Ireland, Indaver Ireland and our other sponsors whose support allows us to plan and present an extensive programme of choral music, and a Festival of major local, national and international significance.

I acknowledge all our collaborators including CCI (Chamber Choir Ireland), CMC, AOIC, CIT Cork School of Music, Cork City Music Library, Christchurch Cathedral Waterford, and the many city and county venues, particularly CSM, St. Fin Barre's Cathedral, Triskel Christchurch, and the Cathedral of St Mary and St Anne, who make their venues available to us to present different types of concerts, and to extend the impact of this Festival to a wider audience base. Lexpress my particular thanks to our dedicated administration team, the members of the Festival's Boards, and the committed involvement of all the volunteers, without whom the Festival could not take place. In that context, I wish to pay tribute to the long and dedicated service of Sonny Cotter who died in the past year. Carmina Burana was composed by Carl Orff in 1935 and 1936. Initially conceived of as a scenic cantata, it is based on 24 poems from the medieval collection, Carmina Burana. Carmina Burana is part of Trionfi, a musical triptych that also includes Catulli Carmina and Trionfo di Afrodite. The first and last movements of the piece are called "Fortuna Imperatrix Mundi" (Fortune, Empress of the World) and start with the very well known "O Fortuna".In 1934, Orff encountered the text in the 1847 edition of the Carmina Burana by Johann Andreas Schmeller. the original text dating mostly from the 11th or 12th century, including some from the 13th century. Michel Hofmann (de), then a young law student and Latin and Greek enthusiast, assisted Orff in the selection and organization of 24 of these poems into a libretto, mostly in Latin verse, with a small amount of Middle High German and Old Provencal. The selection covers a wide range of topics, as familiar in the 13th century as they are in the 21st century: the fickleness of fortune and wealth, the ephemeral nature of life, the joy of the return of Spring, and the pleasures and perils of drinking, gluttony, gambling and lust.

Orff classified Carmina Burana as a collection of "Secular songs for singers and choruses to be sung together with instruments and magic images." Carl Orff states in Palmer's film "O Fortuna" that "Where you are born, and when you are born is everything." In other statements quoted by scholars studying his life and work, he also revealed his belief that the World is all that exists, and that after this life, there is nothing. These ideas are very consistent with esoteric interpretations of the meaning of Fortuna, as one of the Tarot cards, and as a pervasive emblem in manuscripts

from the Middle Ages, including the original Carmina Burana. Moreover. medieval emblems consistently taught that Fortune is blind, and the man that follows it will be led astray. From these experiential concepts about Fortuna we can proceed to more metaphysical meanings, such as Fortuna standing for the cycles of the Universe at large, and by extension, as equivalent to the Eastern idea of Karma. These interpretations may explain why the famous Exordium and Epilogue in Orff's Carmina Burana, the chorus "O Fortuna" has a dark and foreboding affect, in contrast to the orgiastic sensuality displayed in the rest of the piece.

The work is in three sections: In Spring, In the Tavern, and The Court of Love with an opening prologue and finale.

TALLAGHT CHORAL SOCIETY



Tallaght Choral Society was formed in 1967, when Tallaght was still a small village at the foot of the Dublin mountains. A group of singers came together under the direction of Fr. Donal Sweeney OP to form a church choir based in the Dominican Priory. Under a succession of music directors the small church choir gradually took on the mantle of a choral society and now has a membership of over 100. The current music director Mark Armstrong was appointed in 2002 and under his baton the society has continued to flourish and now has a reputation as one of Ireland's strongest choral societies. Tallaght Choral Society has performed all the major choral works and has participated in many RTE productions. Successful collaborations have included performances with the RTE Concert Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland, the National Youth Orchestra of Ireland, R.I.A.M. orchestra, Belfast Philharmonic Choir, Liverpool Welsh Choral Union and most recently a performance of Brahms' German Requiem with the Edinburgh Royal Choral Union in May 2013.

EAST CORK CHORAL SOCIETY

East Cork Choral Society was founded in 1979 as an oratorio choir. It has stayed true to this over the years singing at least 2 of the major oratorios each year. It has a policy of providing a platform for young singers and orchestral players, many of whom have gone on to international careers. Over the years the choir has donated their profits to many charities. Colin Nicholls is only the second conductor of the choir having taken over from Andrew Padmore in 1984.

BAND OF 1 BRIGADE



The Army No. 2 Band was formed in April 1925 at Beggars Bush Barracks, Dublin. It was posted to Cork the following year, where it is currently stationed at Collins Barracks. The numerical titles of all bands, with the exception of the Army No.1 Band, were later changed to territorial styles; thus the Army No.2 Band

became The Band of the Southern Command. Its current title. The Band of 1 Brigade, dates from a reorganisation of the Defence Forces in 1997. In addition to its military commitments, the band plays a major part in the musical and cultural life of the southern region of the country. It regularly appears at important events such as the Cork International Choral Festival and its concert performances at venues such as City Hall. Cork, have won an enthusiastic following. The band's Schools Concert programme is a much-appreciated part of the Defence Forces contribution to the community. In recent years performances abroad have become a feature of the band's schedule and it has performed to acclaim at events such as The International Festival of Military Music at Saumur, France, and the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Toronto, Canada.



LIEUTENANT COLONEL MARK J. ARMSTRONG

Over the past thirty years Mark Armstrong has built a career as one of Ireland's most accomplished and versatile musicians. Equally at ease in the concert hall and recording studio, he has worked with many of



Ireland's top artists and ensembles to critical acclaim. A love of choral music commenced at an early age as a boy chorister and developed through his years in Trinity College Dublin where he was invited to direct College Singers, a sixteen voice choir and Musica Sacra, a choral group specialising in works of the high Barogue. In 1990 Mark was appointed musical director of Dún Laoghaire Choral Society and spent ten years building this group into one of the leading choirs in the country. Guest conducting engagements have included concert performances and recordings with the National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland, RTÉ Concert Orchestra, Irish Chamber Orchestra, Opera Theatre Company, and many more. In 2002 Mark was appointed Musical Director of Tallaght Choral Society and together they have built a strong reputation as one of Ireland's foremost choral societies. Mark currently

holds the appointment of Director of the Defence Forces School of Music in the rank of Lieutenant Colonel with responsibility for the administration, policy, planning, programming and musical direction of Ireland's military bands.

CARA O'SULLIVAN

Cork-born Cara O'Sullivan is one of Ireland's leading sopranos. She has earned a reputation as a fearless interpreter of Mozart, Verdi, Handel and Bellini alongside her extensive career as a concert artist.



Recent highlights:- Nedda from Pagliacci which won the 2013 Irish Times Theatre Award for Opera; a recital tour of Ireland for Music Network; collaborative artist with The Degani Ensemble; concerts in Los Angeles, Phoenix, San Francisco, Perth, Sydney and Singapore; the New Year's Day Viennese gala concerts in The National Concert Hall Dublin and City Hall Cork with the RTE National Symphony Orchestra. Future engagements include the Four Last Songs by Richard Strauss with The Hibernian Orchestra in Dublin and Cork, recitals in St Carthage's Cathedral Lismore, for Lismore Music Festival, Féile na Bealtaine Daingean and National Concert Hall Dublin. Cara continues to tour her acclaimed one woman show .

OWEN GILHOOLY

Owen Gilhooly is a graduate of the Royal College of Music and National Opera Studio, and is currently pursuing Doctoral studies at the Royal Irish Academy of Music. He represented Ireland at the BBC Cardiff



Singer of the World 2007 and 2009 and made his Viennese debut singing the title role in Conti's Don Chisciotte. His roles for OTC include Figaro (Barber of Seville), Dandini (La Cenerentola), Marcello (La Bohème), Father (Hansel and Gretel), Don Fernando (Fidelio) and Papageno (The Magic Flute). He has sung in concert with the RTÉ NSO, Irish Chamber, and Ulster Orchestras, the Bournemouth, and Tokyo Symphony Orchestras, and the Royal Liverpool, and London Philharmonic Orchestras. He recently appeared at the Buxton Festival as Ivan in Rimsky Korsakov's Kaschey the Immortal and Bailiff in Sibelius' The Maiden in the Tower to critical acclaim. He also joined Wide Open Opera singing Hirt in its inaugural production of Tristan und Isolde and returned to Opera Theatre Company to sing Guglielmo (Cosi fan tutte). Future plans include Brahms' Requiem and the premiere of Seoirse Bodley's Mignon und der Harfner, Il Conte (Le Nozze di Figaro), and Abraham in Sally Beamish's new opera Hagar in the Wilderness.

PETER KERR

Peter Kerr was born in Dublin and began his musical career as a choirboy in St Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin. After many years playing and singing in a pop group he returned to St Patrick's



Cathedral where he became one of the Lav Vicars Choral. He began his studies with Frank Cowle in Dublin and later in London with Rudolf Piernay and Bernard Dickerson. He first made his reputation as a very fine interpreter of oratorio and has sung all the major tenor roles with choral societies throughout Ireland, the UK and Europe. His work with RTE has included the tenor soloist in the award-winning production of Handel's Messiah and a documentary on the life of Count John McCormack. He has sung in many concerts with the RTE Symphony and Concert orchestras, which included the recording of Charles Villiers Stanford's Requiem with the RTE Symphony Orchestra. In the world of opera he has appeared with Opera Theatre Company in their productions of The Turn of the Screw, in the role of Peter Quint, and The Rape of Lucretia, in the role of 'Male Chorus'. He has also appeared in many musicals including those with the Glasnevin Musical Society, Cork Opera and Kinsale Opera.

VOCES8 is one of the most exciting and versatile vocal groups in the world. The multi-awardwinning ensemble fulfils an international annual touring schedule across Europe, the USA, Asia and Africa. Performance venues include the Wigmore Hall, Royal Festival Hall, Tokyo Opera City, Mariinsky Theatre Concert Hall, Tel Aviv Opera House, National Concert Hall Taipei, Cite de la Musique in Paris, Dijon Opera House, National Centre for the Performing Arts Beijing and Shanghai Concert Hall. Outreach and Education are at the core of VOCES8's work and the group is delighted to be the flagship performance and education ensemble of the charitable music foundation, Voces Cantabiles Music (VCM). The ensemble leads an innovative series of music education workshops reaching 20,000 people annually around the world with the aim of inspiring creativity and excellence through music. The innovative education work of VCM has received praise from UNESCO. In 2013 VCM established the Gresham Centre in partnership with the Diocese of London, a vocal Centre for

Excellence at Sir Christopher Wren's beautiful St Anne & St Agnes Church, in the City of London. VOCES8 is also resident ensemble at Bedford School, Ardingly College, The Grey Coat Hospital and Milton Abbey. Artistic collaborations with orchestras have included the Philharmonia, London Philharmonic Orchestra and period ensemble Les Inventions. VOCES8 has received support from Arts Council England, the Musicians Benevolent Fund and the Worshipful Company of Musicians. In 2013, the world lost two leading lights in composition: Steve Martland in May and Sir John Tavener in November. As we approach the 1st anniversary of Martland's death, we pay tribute to both Martland and Tavener in programming some of their best known choral works: Sea Songs and Street Songs by Martland and Tavener's The Lamb and Song for Athene. In April 2014, Chamber Choir Ireland gave the world premiere of internationally renowned US composer David Lang's When we were children and are delighted to present it again as part of the Cork International Choral Festival together with the world premiere of the joint Festival and Chamber Choir Ireland commission from Irish composer David Fennessy: Letter to Michael along with the world premiere of the Seán Ó Riada Competition winner Donal Mac Erlaine's Solomon Grundy.

Chamber Choir Ireland

Chamber Choir Ireland is the country's flagship choral ensemble under the internationally celebrated and multi-award-winning choral conductor Paul Hilliar as Artistic Director



Hillier as Artistic Director. Formerly the National Chamber Choir of Ireland, the Choir is known for its unique approach to programming

and has gained a reputation for the high artistic quality of its performances. The Choir remains a thriving force on a very active choral scene both at home and abroad.

Since its inception, the Choir has made a significant contribution to the development of contemporary Irish choral music through its commitment to commissioning new work. The Choir's repertoire spans early to contemporary music, along with regular commissions of pioneering choral work by both Irish and International composers. Commissions have included composers such as Gerald Barry, Tarik O'Regan, Kevin Volans, Andrew Hamilton, Siobhán Cleary, and Jennifer Walshe.

The Choir has a strong commitment to touring in Ireland and continues to develop its touring network in order to present high quality choral concerts to audiences all around the country. Internationally, the Choir has toured in Europe, Asia and South America and

in 2011 undertook its first US tour with the assistance of Culture Ireland as part of Imagine Ireland, a year of Irish Arts in America following on from a performance in The White House in March 2011.

In recent years the Choir has a renewed commitment to recording with recent releases including One Day Fine on the RTÉ Lyric FM label and Acallam na Senórach on the Harmonia Mundi label, as well as a recording to accompany the publication of Choirland: An Anthology of Irish Choral Music in collaboration with the Contemporary Music Centre and the Association of Irish Choirs. Future releases include a recording of works by Gerald Barry featuring the Crash Ensemble, and a collection of Christmas music on the Harmonia Mundi label.

The Choir continues to foster relationships with other distinguished performing ensembles and organisations both at home and abroad including the Crash Ensemble, Theatre of Voices, Irish Baroque Orchestra, Kronos Quartet, Irish Chamber Orchestra, Contemporary Music Centre, and the Association of Irish Choirs. The Choir enjoys a unique relationship with Cork International Choral Festival where it is Choir-in-Residence on an annual basis.

Principal funding for Chamber Choir Ireland comes from the Arts Council/an Chomhairle Ealaíon, the Arts Council of Northern Ireland National Lottery Fund and Dublin City Council. The Choir is a Resident Ensemble in the National Concert Hall and Affiliated Artists to Dublin City University.

Paul Hillier

Artistic Director and Principal Conductor

Paul Hillier is from Dorset in England and studied at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London. His career has embraced singing, conducting, and writing about music. Earlier in



his career he was founding director of the Hilliard Ensemble, and subsequently founded Theatre of Voices. He has taught in the USA at the University of California campuses at Santa Cruz and Davis, and from 1996-2003 was Director of the Early Music Institute at Indiana University. He was Principal Conductor of the Estonian Philharmonic Chamber Choir (2001-2007) and has been Chief Conductor of Ars Nova Copenhagen since 2003.

His recordings, over a hundred CDs including seven solo recitals, have earned worldwide acclaim and won numerous prizes. His books about Arvo Pärt and Steve Reich, together with numerous anthologies of choral music, are published by Oxford University Press.

In 2006 he was awarded an OBE for services to choral music. In 2007 he received the Order of the White Star of Estonia, and was awarded a Grammy for Best Choral Recording. In 2008 he took up the position of Artistic Director and Chief Conductor of Chamber Choir Ireland, and in 2009 was invited to form the new Coro Casa da Musica in Porto, Portugal. In 2010 he won a second Grammy (this time in the small ensemble category), for Theatre of Voices' recording of David Lang's *The Little Match Girl Passion* (which also won a Pulitzer Prize), together with a selection of choral works by Lang, sung by Ars Nova Copenhagen.





This book by the Irish pianist Tilly Fleischmann, written 60 years ago, now published in full for the first time, documents an oral tradition of continental pianism going back to the 19th century. From 1901–5 the author studied at the Royal Academy of Music in Munich with two pupils of Franz Liszt; she records what she learnt from them about Liszt's interpretations of the piano music of his contemporaries and of his own works. The many illustrations from the classical repertoire have been played and video-recorded by Gabriela Mayer on the DVD accompanying the book.

Madrigal '75

Madrigal '75 is a vocal ensemble based in Cork City. Founded in 1975 by university students, the choir now comprises a diverse combination of singers from all walks of life. Madrigal '75 has developed a reputation as a vocal ensemble of great skill and beauty, performing repertoire from as early as the 14th century right through to contemporary choral works, both sacred and secular, including first performances of new commissions.

In 2005 Madrigal '75 was a prominent participant in the Cork European Capital of Culture events and toured France with its members acting as cultural ambassadors for the city. Madrigal '75 is also the winner of the Carols for Christmas 2006 and 2012 competitions on RTE Lyric FM. Other successes include Best Choir at the Montreux Festival, several Best Performances and First Prize awards at successive Cork International Choral Festivals, and the Irish Choir of the Year award. In 2013, Madrigal '75 paid a return visit to Montreux and was the highest placed choir in the mixed-voice category as well as being a Grand Prix Finalist.

The choir has performed with several of Ireland's leading ensembles, including the RTE Vanbrugh String Quartet and the Orchestra of St Cecilia. In 2008 and 2011 respectively, the choir presented the closing and opening concerts of the prestigious East Cork Early Music Festival.

Since January 2007, Madrigal '75 has been directed by James Taylor, organist and harpsichordist, who, having held posts in the UK, New Zealand and Canada, now lectures at CIT Cork School of Music and is Assistant Director of Music at St Fin Barre's Cathedral, Cork.

Teampall Fuaime (sound temple) is the result of an 8-month project between composer Ian Wilson and the Cork Chamber Choir. Members of the choir firstly provided original texts in direct response to spending time in the Triskel Christchurch space then, with the composer's encouragement, also provided melodic fragments for parts of those texts; often each member would provide a piece of melody for both their own text and someone else's, thus creating a broad pool of material.

The composer then used this textual and musical material as the basis of a large-scale choral work which, as well as exploring ideas specific to the architecture and character of Triskel Christchurch, also examines ideas evoked and provoked by that space, including faith, society, war and daily life. The result is a work that speaks broadly of the human experience, very much shaped by the singers and the space they will sing in. Part of the work's concept is to fully employ Triskel Christchurch and therefore the choir sings in different parts of the space at different times during the work.

Teampall fuaime was funded through the Arts Council of Ireland's Artist in the Community scheme managed by CREATE.

The College of Clerks Choral in Youghal is an ancient institution, founded in 1464 by Thomas FitzGerald, Earl of Desmond. The College originally consisted of eight fellows and eight singing clerks—a choral foundation which was dissolved and reinstated a number of times over the centuries. The present choir represents the latest revival (2005) of the Clerks Choral directed by the much accomplished Ian Sexton.

Although the Clerks Choral remains informally associated with the magnificent Collegiate Church in Youghal, the group is most active in venues throughout Munster at Divine Service (of all denominations), weddings and concerts. The Clerks Choral regularly features on RTÉ Radio 1 and Lyric FM. They have also performed in England and their rendition of Compline in St. Anne's Church, Shandon, has become a regular feature of the Cork International Choral Festival. Compline is the last church service of the day; it is a contemplative office, with an emphasis on spiritual peace.

Cór Chúil Aodha celebrates its 50th Anniversary this year and so are adding to the Festival's celebrations with a special Festival Celebratory Mass in Cork's beautiful North Cathedral.

The Cúil Aodha Choir was founded in 1964 by Seán Ó Riada and his friend an tAthair Donnacha Ó Concubhair. From that date until his death in 1971, Seán Ó Riada composed two masses and arranged many lay and liturgical texts for this choir. In this period, both Latin and the Irish language were being used. This was an exciting time in church-music as the Second Vatican Council had just finished and same radical new changes to liturgy were being implemented as well as the vernacular language being re-introduced. Peadar Ó Riada is in charge of the choir since the first Sunday of September 1971. He has many liturgical and lay texts set to music for the choir since then. The choir fulfils its weekly obligations to the community of Cúil Aodha with the Sunday Mass at 10:00 am and any funerals weddings etc. that may take place. They also give concerts, recitals and liturgical services in Ireland, Scotland and further afield.

It is an all-male choir from its inception. Fathers bring their sons along when they are about two to three years of age and they, in turn, grow up learning the culture of the choir. The choir does not sing in English nor do they perform other people's work. Their repertoire exceeds a hundred pieces between lay and liturgical settings.

The 46th Seminar on New Choral Music

Friday 2nd May, 2–4pm, Stack Theatre, CIT Cork School of Music, Union Quay

Admission: Free of charge

The Cork International Choral Festival has a longstanding commitment to foster awareness and appreciation of new choral music. With this in mind a seminar was initiated in 1962 as part of the Festival programme by the late Aloys Fleischmann, Professor of Music at University College Cork, as being central to this purpose. The Festival presents the 46th edition of the Seminar on New Choral Music as a joint collaboration with Chamber Choir Ireland, our choir in residence. To date, 132 works from 109 Irish and international composers have been commissioned.

The Seminar on New Choral Music maintains its initial purpose of commissioning new works to provide a platform for, and to encourage the composition, and performance of new choral music in Ireland, and to support their inclusion, and that of other new music, onto the regular repertoire of Irish choirs. In the last few years the Seminar has specifically promoted the commission of new works by Irish composers to develop a wider knowledge of, and understanding of, Irish compositional life. Premiere performances are now integrated into a full concert programme by Chamber Choir Ireland. The present style of presentation makes the seminar very accessible to all, and assists in making current practice in the performance of new choral music accessible to the wider choral sector in Ireland.

This year will see two new works featured, and given their world premieres in Cork; *Letter to Michael* by composer David Fennessy and *Solomon Grundy* by the winner of this year's Seán Ó Riada Competition, Donal Mac Erlaine. The Seán Ó Riada Competition was initiated in 1972 in recognition of the creative life and work of Seán Ó Riada. It is a composition competition which invites the submission of new works from Irish composers in collaboration between Cork International Choral Festival and Chamber Choir Ireland. This year the competition received entries from 30 composers, maintaining the high entry level of the past 4 years. We are delighted to welcome both composers to Cork for the Seminar.

Without the financial support of the Arts Council in making the commission of David Fennessy possible, and of the Ó Riada Family for its generous support of the Seán Ó Riada Competition, this seminar would not be in a position to continue to fulfil its important role in promoting the work of Irish composers and encouraging the composition of new choral music.

I welcome Rhona Clarke, a highly regarded composer in her own right and a great friend of the Festival, as Seminar Chairperson, and thank Majella Hollywood, Chief Executive of the CCI, for her commitment to continue the involvement of Chamber Choir Ireland in this project.

This year's Seminar Programme will also feature (a) a most interesting talk by Coral O'Sullivan on the history of the Festival's Seminars. Titled From Archer to Zuk - Fifty Years of the Cork International Choral Festival Seminars, it will detail, in a multi-faceted manner, the exhaustive research Carol has completed for her MA thesis, and (b) a Performance Reading Session with Chamber Choir Ireland, of works by Seán Doherty and Sam Perkin, selected by the Seán Ó Riada Assessment Panel. Finally, I would direct your attention to the full collection of Seminar scores now housed in the Cork City Music Library and available for consultation. General information on the Seminar, including digitised pages of scores, is now also available for perusal on the Library website. I would like to publicly thank Kitty Buckley, Executive Librarian, for all her dedicated and committed work in following through on the completion of this archive.

Letter to Michael

"A few years ago I came across an extraordinary image by a woman named Emma Hauck (1878-1920). It was of a page of text written so densely in pencil that it was almost completely black and more or less illegible. Hauck was a patient in the psychiatric hospital of the University of Heidleberg and in the summer of 1909 wrote many similar pages in the form of letters to her husband Michael, begging him to come and collect her. The text consists simply of the phrase 'Herzenschatzi Komm' (Sweetheart come) written over and over again, many hundreds of times or simply 'Komm' (Come). It seems the letters were never sent and her pleas were left unheard."

David Fennessy

David Fennessy (b. 1976 Maynooth) began his musical life as guitarist in a school rock band but had no formal musical training until the age of fifteen when he decided to study classical guitar. He became interested in



composition whilst studying for his undergraduate degree at the Dublin College of Music. In 1998 Fennessy moved to Glasgow to study for his Masters Degree at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama with James MacMillan. He was later invited to join the composition faculty and has held a teaching post there since 2005. His music has been performed nationally and internationally by many groups including the RTE National Symphony Orchestra and the RTE Concert Orchestra, Royal Scottish National Orchestra, BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, BBC Symphony Orchestra, Ensemble Modern, Hebrides Ensemble and London Sinfonietta. Recent significant works include Pass the Spoon, an evening-length music theatre collaboration with the English visual artist David Shrigley and Haupstimme, a work for solo viola and ensemble premiered by Garth Knox with Rednote Ensemble at last year's Huddersfield Festival. Since 2012 he has been working on a trilogy of largescale works based on the diaries of the German film director Werner Herzog written during the production of the 1982 movie Fitzcarraldo.His music is published by Universal Edition (Vienna).

Rhona Clarke - Seminar Chairperson

Rhona Clarke was born in Dublin. She studied music at University College, Dublin, and completed a Ph.D. at Queen's University, Belfast. She is a lecturer in music at St Patrick's College, Dublin City University. Her output



includes choral, chamber, orchestral and electronic works. She has received commissions from RTÉ National Symphony Orchestra, the Cork International Choral Festival, Concorde, Music Network and the National Concert Hall, among others. Her work has been performed and broadcast throughout Ireland and worldwide.

Recent works include SHIFT for orchestra (2013), which received its premiere in the Horizons series at the National Concert Hall, performed by The RTÉ NSO conducted by Gavin Maloney, and a newly commissioned work in collaboration with visual artist Marie Hanlon for Concorde, performed at the RHA Gallery, Dublin. From July- September 2014 her work will feature alongside Hanlon's in a two-person exhibition at Draoícht Arts Centre. Rhona Clarke is a member of Aosdána, Ireland's state-sponsored academy of creative artists.



Seán Ó Riada Competition

The Seán Ó Riada Competition was initiated in 1972 in recognition of the creative life and work of Seán Ó Riada. In its revised format it is a composition competition which invites submissions from composers, born or resident in Ireland, and is a collaboration between the Cork International Choral Festival and Choir in Residence, Chamber Choir Ireland. Assessment takes place under pseudonym. The members of this year's assessment panel were Rhona Clarke (Seminar Chairperson), David Fennessy (commissioned composer 2014), and Paul Hillier (Artistic Director and Conductor, Chamber Choir Ireland).

The winning composition becomes a featured work at the Seminar on New Choral Music, held annually as part of the Festival. The work receives its premiere performance at a Gala Concert given by Chamber Choir Ireland, conducted by Paul Hillier, on Friday 2nd May 2014. The winning composer also attends the Festival and plays an active part in the Friday Seminar session, as well as the Performance Reading Sessions of highly recommended works on the following day.

The winning composer is awarded the Seán Ó Riada Trophy, and a prize of €750 euro, donated by the Ó Riada Family. Previous winners include well-known names such as Rhona Clarke, Patrick Connolly, Frank Corcoran, Séamas de Barra, Michael Holohan, Marian Ingoldsby, Simon MacHale, Michael McGlynn, Kevin O'Connell, and last year's winner, Solfa Carlile.

The Festival would like to extend its congratulations to this year's winner Donal Mac Erlaine for his winning composition *Solomon Grundy*.

2014 Winning Composition: Solomon Grundy

Composer: Donal Mac Erlaine

"Solomon Grundy is based on a nonsense poem which is ordinarily used to teach young children the order of the days in the week. I chose this text because of its meaninglessness to adults, to whom this order is taken for granted. Because of how I was going to treat the text, it was necessary to pick something that was not serious. I don't mean not serious in that it's meaningless, but rather something that is not taken seriously.

Despite this, there is much poignancy regarding the semantics of the poem. Mostly it is the sounds of the words that relate to the musical material and their meaning which relates to the piece as a whole. It opens in a very traditional choral vein but its form soon depletes to chaos. It is in these wilder moments that I call for the singers to improvise each to their own in order to juxtapose many layers of sound. To perform this music without an element of improvisation would be impossible, and therefore each individual performance itself is unique." Donal Mac Erlaine, March 2014

Donal Mac Erlaine

Donal Mac Erlaine initially trained as a musicologist. He is a self-taught guitarist and composer. He has been involved with film, theatre and dance in addition to working as a soloist.

He holds a diploma in classical guitar from the



RIAM and a masters degree in historical musicology from UCD and presented the world-music radio show Counter Points on DublinCityFM and CuriousBroadcast. com. His music has been performed by Concorde, Atlas Ensemble, Quiet Music Ensemble, Dublin Laptop Orchestra, Rhombus, John Feeley and others and his educational works have won special and honourable mentions in international composition competitions.

He is currently working on a set of guitar etudes as well as an extended dance collaboration. His debut album El Sur, which is an imaginary journey through South American guitar music, is available for free. **www. donalmac.com**

From Archer to Zuk

Fifty Years of the Cork International Choral Festival Seminars

The Seminars on Contemporary Choral Music of the Cork International Choral Festival have generated a significant platform for the development of choral composition in Ireland. During the 50-year period from 1962 to 2012, 128 works from 105 Irish and international composers were commissioned for the 44 Seminars. These compositions reflect the development of choral composition and performance, both nationally and internationally, through the provision of an opportunity for creative freedom, enlightened debate, and performer and audience development.

Until recently, the Seminar scores were held in several locations and were not comprehensively catalogued or indexed. They have now found a permanent home in the Music Section of the Cork City Library. This presentation, highlighting the content of Coral O'Sullivan's MA Thesis, examines the context for the origination of this corpus of material, discusses the generation of the annotated catalogue of the collection, and presents an overview of the Seminar compositional issues, musical styles and vocal techniques which feature in the Seminar works, and concludes with an outline of the current role of the Seminars. This talk is presented as part of this year's 46th Seminar on New Choral Music.

Coral O'Sullivan is a Law Graduate of University College Cork, later graduating with a B Mus. and an M.A. from CIT Cork School of Music, where she lectures in Oboe. She also teaches Oboe with the County Cork School of Music. Coral is a Librarian with the Cork County Library and Arts Service, and is an active free-lance musician.

Are there prominent voices in your choir? Are their voices you never hear? Do each of the voice lines blend as if they were one voice?

Sacred Harp is a four-part a cappella music dating from the 16th through the 20th centuries, and is characterised by haunting harmonies, traditional modes, raucous songs, serene hymns, fast fugues, and high-energy anthems. "The Sacred Harp" is a tunebook first published in 1844 in Georgia, USA. The phrase can also be interpreted as referring to the inherent human ability to make music with the voice, a "sacred harp". how it works. No choir member sings alone and all that is required is for choir members to change places! Choir Voicing is one of the easiest and most effective ways to improve the overall sound of your choir.

KEVIN O'CARROLL Conductor

Kevin O'Carroll is a Waterford based freelance conductor. He currently directs a number of Irish community choirs and a professional choral ensemble. Equally at home in front of orchestra, choir or musical theatre groups, he has been guest conductor for choirs, orchestras and



musical societies all over Ireland and abroad. Having studied with the internationally renowned conducting clinician Dr. John Dickson in the USA and Cambridge, Kevin is recognised nationally as a choral specialist. He is in demand throughout Ireland as an adjudicator, conducting teacher and for choral workshops. In 2012 he was conducting consultant on a film for BBC television, Loving Miss Hatto. Kevin's 2013 book on choral conducting (Choral Conducting – A Handbook for Irish Choir Trainers and Conductors), is aimed at supporting new or reluctant choral conductors and is used as a text book by several colleges. Kevin holds a Dip. ABRSM in Choral Conducting, a B.A. (Hons.) in Music and Business Management and a Master of Music in Choral Conducting performance. In September



2014 he hopes to commence PhD studies in the University of Limerick. The topic of his research relates to performance practice of Renaissance choral music and the impact of modern notation on such performance.

The notation in the book is written in shapes that correspond to degrees of the scale, designed to make it easier to learn to sight-sing with no prior experience. This tradition is democratic and egalitarian, with participants arranged in a hollow square; facing each other so as to sing with each other and for each other.

Eimear O'Donovan will host a beginners' workshop to introduce newcomers to the Sacred Harp tradition. An introduction to shape notation, singing in four part harmony and some very basic music theory will be covered. No experience necessary.



17th Composers in the Classroom Seminar

The Composers in the Classroom scheme is an initiative which brings professional composers and musicians, quite literally, into the classroom as part of a special curriculum devised for transition year music students and their teachers.

Initiated in 1998 by Cork International Choral Festival and the Arts Officers of Cork City and Cork County Councils, the scheme offers music students and their teachers the opportunity to work with professional composers throughout the school year.

The scheme has been highly successful in encouraging and assisting students, many with little or no musical training, in their musical creativity and experimentation. Students are required to listen to a wide range of music, analysing and discussing various elements. For the teacher, the residency provides an opportunity to work alongside a professional composer, discussing and developing approaches to creative composition in the classroom.

The residency culminates in a seminar held as part of the Cork International Choral Festival, where student get the chance to perform their compositions and listen to the work of other schools in the scheme.

Recent work includes: directing and musical direction Kiss of the Spider Woman - Half Moon/Cork Opera House; Orpheus - Everyman Theatre; musical direction and arranging Maria de Buenos Aires - Cork Opera House; musical direction Spindle - Big House Festival; conducting, co-directing and arranging Pagliacci at the Everyman (winner Best Opera Production Irish Times Theatre Awards); directing and designing the set for the acclaimed production of Dido & Aeneas at the Cork Opera House which toured across Ireland: directing the dance film Inner Landscapes, musical direction for the premieres of two modern operas Thamyrus and Time for Farthenware at the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford: creating the Voice Effect choir which performed with the RTÉ Concert orchestra at the recent Steve Reich festival in Cork; and writing the music for the feature film Tree Keeper.

Other recent projects include conducting and designing Sweeney Todd at the Everyman and Cork Opera House; a tour as conductor of contemporary Irish choral music with ArtLifeCulture to Pecs, Hungary and to the world EXPO in Shanghai, China; working as musical director and pianist on Side by Side by Sondheim at the Everyman; conducting West Side Story, directing and conducting Candide (both at Cork Opera House); The Magic Flute (Cork Opera House and regional tour); and completing an Irish national tour as director and pianist on The Nina in Me.



Artists: Fleischmann International Trophy Award

Contemporary Irish artists Liam Lavery and Eithne Ring have been working and collaborating on art projects since 1988. Their work has developed from painting and small low-relief wall panels made of cast aluminium, through to large-scale public commissions using a variety of different materials; bronze, wood, copper, enamels, glass and stainless steel.

Liam has been creating unique sculptures for the Cork International Choral Festival since 1994, "affording him the opportunity to be spontaneous and self-indulgent in a way that is more closely related to the nature of his sketchbooks and watercolours, which is very different to the more disciplined process of creating public artworks. Eithne has created a number of National Trophies.

This year's sculpture, a collaboration between Liam and Eithne, is inspired by a small extract from a hand written score by Aloys Fleischmann merging with the iconic "goldie fish" atop St. Anne's, Shandon" along with other musical motifs and stylized vocalists using cast aluminium as the primary material combined with enamelled copper.

"When I was growing up on the rocky headland of Knockadoon, East Cork, my father had a small foundry and as a result of working with him in his workshop I developed an interest in detail and decoration and the desire to make objects. Making



objects are very important to me as I interpret my environment and make sense of the mark of man on his surroundings with the resulting metamorphosis from page to finished piece."

Liam Lavery

"Most of my ideas are born in that place between sleeping and waking. One of my earliest dawn dreams was one which coincided with the dawn train which used to pass near my childhood home. In the dream the sandman, who lived on the moon,



drove a bulldozer and pushed back the darkness to let the daylight through. Drawing is important to me, because it takes me to that space where the sandman reveals the light in the darkness, which grows into a sketch that may become a sculpture."

Artists: National Competition Awards

Don Cronin studied sculpture to degree level at the Crawford College of Art and Design, graduating in 1994 having previously completed a B.A. in Philosophy at U.C.C. Now based in his studio near Innishannon, Co.Cork, Don divides his time between work produced as public art and more intimate work produced for galleries. County Councils including Cork, Kerry, Mayo, Leitrim and Tipperary and Limerick have commissioned work from the artist under the Per Cent for Art Scheme. His work also features in several public and private collections here and abroad including the Civic Art Collection of San Francisco. He works in a variety of materials but most often in bronze and stainless steel.

"The principles that informed the production of these small sculptures are the same as those principles that inform my work generally regardless of scale. 'Composition in Green' relies on an intuitive use of line, balance, volume and colour in a bid to produce forms of resolved character and an air of 'rightness'."

International Adjudicators

Mark Armstrong IRELAND

Mark Armstrong is one of Ireland's most accomplished and versatile musicians. A love of choral music commenced at an early age as a boy chorister and developed through his years in Trinity College Dublin where he was invited to direct the College Singers, a sixteen voice choir and Musica Sacra, a choral group specialising in



works of the high Barogue. Guest conducting engagements have included concert performances and recordings with the National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland, RTÉ Concert Orchestra, Irish Chamber Orchestra, Opera Theatre Company, Irish Film Orchestra, RTÉ Chamber Choir, RTE Philharmonic Choir, National Chamber Choir, and RTÉ Cór na nÓg. Mark has been musical director of both Dún Laoghaire Choral Society and Tallaght Choral Society and has conducted collaborative concert performances with the Liverpool Welsh Choral Union (Requiem – G. Verdi) and the Edinburgh Royal Choral Union (German Requiem - J. Brahms). He has been a board member of the Association of Irish Choirs and has acted as conducting tutor on conducting courses run by AOIC. Mark currently holds the appointment of Director of the Defence Forces School of Music in the rank of Lieutenant Colonel with responsibility for the administration, policy, planning, programming and musical direction of Ireland's military bands. Mark is delighted to have been invited to conduct Carl Orff's Carmina Burana with Tallaght Choral Society and the East Cork Choral Society in the opening concert of this year's 60th anniversary Cork Choral Festival and to act as the Irish representative on this year's panel of international adjudicators.

Mervyn Cousins ENGLAND

Mervyn Cousins was a Cathedral Chorister at Southwell in Nottinghamshire. He read for a Music Degree at Royal Holloway College, University of London, and was Organ Scholar there. He was a prizewinner both at University and at Royal College of Organists examinations. After posts in London, at St Bride's Church, Fleet Street and St



James', Sussex Gardens, Mervyn was appointed as Assistant Director of Music at St Edmundsbury Cathedral in 1987. He became Director of Music there in 1993 and was also Chorus Master of the Bury St Edmunds Festival Chorus. Mervyn was Director of Music at Liverpool Metropolitan Cathedral from 1997 until 2003, and he was also Organist to the University of Liverpool during this time. He has directed choirs and given recitals in many parts of the world as well as adjudicating at festivals in several countries. He moved to Wales as Music Director of the Llangollen International Musical Eisteddfod in September 2003, becoming its Executive Director in 2008. Mervyn moved from the festival in 2011, and he now combines work for Mid Wales Opera with ABRSM examining at home and abroad. He returns to Merseyside regularly to promote singing in primary schools. Mervyn is also a member of the Board of Glyndŵr University (Wrexham). Mervyn's other interests include walking and bird-watching. He is married to Margaret, Senior Lecturer in Psychology at Chester University (herself a professional singer); they live in the hills above Llangollen with their three-legged cat Missie!

Lorenzo Donati ITALY

Composer, conductor and violinist, Lorenzo Donati has studied in Arezzo and Florence under eminent international musicians. Performing concerts with Vocale Vox Cordis, Hesperimenta Vocal Ensemble di Arezzo, and Vocalia Consort di Roma, he has won awards both nationally and internationally. His conducting experience



includes the Coro Giovanile Italiano (Italian Youth Choir). which he has co-directed since 2011, and he is involved in FENIARCO (Italian National Federation of Regional Choirs Association). In 2007 he won first prize in both sections at the International Competition for Choir Conductors "Mariele Ventre" in Bologna. He teaches choral conducting at the Conservatory of Trento, and is often invited to adjudicate at international competitions. As a composer, his pieces are performed by ensembles and soloists around the world including Coro Giovanile Italiano, St. Jakobs Chamber Choir from Sweden & Philippine Madrigal Singers, and he has won notable prizes in international competitions including Arezzo, Gorizia, Avellino and Vittorio Veneto. His expertise as a teacher is in worldwide demand, and he has held courses in choral music and composition in Italy, China, France and Russia, and for the Choral Academy and Fondazione Guido d'Arezzo.

Maria Gamborg Helbekkmo NORWAY

Educated as a pianist, singer and a conductor, Helbekkmo is professor emeritus at Bergen University College, where she used to teach choir conducting, piano and solo voice. Helbekkmo has gained wide recognition as a musician and a teacher, and is especially known for her work with the female choir Voci Nobili. Her



determination, combined with her artistic abilities and her unique musical ambiance shaped Voci Nobili into one of the top choirs in Europe with numerous international first prizes. In 2005 Helbekkmo won the Norwegian Choral Association's annual prize together with Voci Nobili, and in 2006 she was awarded H.M. The Kings Medal of Merit in Gold for her educational and artistic contribution to Norwegian music. Maria Gamborg Helbekkmo is a frequent lecturer at international conferences. She is also frequently used as a member of international jurys. She is a member of honour in the Norwegian Society of Choir-conductors (FONOKO).

Prof. Volker Hempfling GERMANY

Born in the Saarland, Germany, Volker studied music in Herford and Cologne. From 1972 to 1997 he was organist and church music director (KMD) and conductor of the Domkantorei Altenberg as well as director of the "Sacred Music" series at Altenberg cathedral. In 1968 Hempfing founded the world famous



Kölner Kantorei, specializing in a cappella music of the Romantic and modern periods. In 1983 he became director of Cologne's Gürzenich-Chor. In 1984-85 Hempfling was recipient of a Deutscher Musikrat fellowship for work with Sawallisch and Penderecki. In addition to guest conducting appearances, he acts as a lecturer in conducting and vocal training courses throughout the world. He has been head of the jury of three editions of the Marktoberdorf Chamber Choir Competition. In 1985 he became professor for choral conducting at the University of Music Saarbücken. From 1993 – 2004 he was professor of choral conducting, director of the Protestant Church Music division and conductor of the chamber choir in the Robert Schumann-Hochschule in Düsseldorf. In June 2004 he conducted the World Youth Chamber Choir to mark the 60th anniversary of D-day in Normandy, France. In 2006 he edited "Lore-Ley", the first edition of a German Folksong Book for mixed choirs. In July 2008 Volker was a member of the Artistic Committee for the World Symposium on Choral Music, Copenhagen. Since 2003 Hempfling is lecturer of the International Seminars for Choral Conducting in the Bavarian Music Academy following the International Chamber Choir Competitions Marktoberdorf.

Schools Adjudicators

Deirdre Moynihan IRELAND

As a soprano soloist Deirdre performs with many operatic, orchestral, choral and chamber music groups both in Ireland and on the International stage. She is an early music specialist and also embraces the challenge of contemporary compositions. Recent premieres include works by Raymond Deane,




Bill Whelan, Ian Wilson and Brian Irvine. She has been a soloist with, amongst others, the R.T.É Concert Orchestra, R.T.É National Symphony Orchestra, Irish Baroque Orchestra and Irish Chamber Orchestra. Radio broadcasts include Lyric FM, RTE Radio 1 and BBC Radio Ulster. She was a former member of and soloist with the National Chamber Choir of Ireland. She has worked as the soprano coach for The Irish Youth Choir and is the Director of the vocal ensemble Moving Voices. Much in demand as a vocal coach, she has been invited to give many singing masterclasses and ensemble workshops. In 2013 Deirdre devised, launched and arranged music for the choral music website "Choirs Can" - www.choirscan. com. She holds an MA in performance from the Cork School of Music and her first solo CD of Vivaldi Cantatas is due for release by Naxos in January 2014.

Kevin O'Carroll IRELAND

Kevin O'Carroll is а Waterford based freelance He currently conductor. directs a number of Irish community choirs and а professional choral ensemble. Equally at home in front of orchestra, choir or musical theatre groups, he has been quest conductor for choirs, orchestras and



musical societies all over Ireland and abroad. Having studied with the internationally renowned conducting clinician Dr. John Dickson in the USA and Cambridge, Kevin is recognised nationally as a choral specialist. He is in demand throughout Ireland as an adjudicator, conducting teacher and for choral workshops. In 2012 he was conducting consultant on a film for BBC television, Loving Miss Hatto, Kevin's 2013 book on choral conducting (Choral Conducting - A Handbook for Irish Choir Trainers and Conductors), is aimed at supporting new or reluctant choral conductors and is used as a text book by several colleges. Kevin holds a Dip. ABRSM in Choral Conducting, a B.A. (Hons.) in Music and Business Management and a Master of Music in Choral Conducting performance. In September 2014 he hopes to commence PhD studies in the University of Limerick. The topic of his research relates to performance practice of Renaissance choral music and the impact of modern notation on such performance.

Agria Swara choral group is made up from the student body of Bogor Agricultural University, Indonesia, regularly holding concerts open to the public and for on-campus activities such as graduation ceremonies. The 2002 milestone concert 'The Odyssey', the first by the choir to feature Western classical music, has since become an annual tradition. Currently conducted by Arvin Zeinullah, the baton has previously been held by such prominent people as Victor Purba and Ingrid Maryane Cahya. Agria Swara has proven itself to be one of the most promising students choirs in Indonesia, winning prizes in choir competitions worldwide (Wernigerode, Germany 2005; Budapest, Hungary 2007; and Rimini, Italy 2009).


BLARNEY CASTLE

Visitors get a fascinating insight into day-to-day prison life at a time when the high walls ensured no escape and denied law-abiding citizens the opportunity to see one of the finest examples of Ireland's architectural heritage.

Stepping inside, visitors are



taken back in time to the 19th century. Wandering through the wings of the Gaol, the cells are furnished with amazingly life-like wax figures; original graffiti on cell walls tell the innermost feelings of some inmates, while a very spectacular audio visual tells the social history and contrasting lifestyles of 19th c. Cork and why some people turned to crime, and some ended up in Australia.

This exhibition fascinates visitors of all ages and nationalities and is available in up to 13 languages.




